

YEAR-END ACCOMPLISHMENT REPORT
January to December 2010

Highlights of Activities:

1. **Crisis Intervention Center (CIC)** - This is a social protection program that caters to women and children who are in especially difficult circumstances (WEDC and CEDC). The services include but not limited to provisions of psycho-social intervention, medical intervention, psychiatric intervention, rescue and recovery operations, limited financial assistance for transportation and medication, educational assistance, legal assistance and other support services.

For this year, there are 46 women and 71 children who are catered. Below is the specific detail of the data:

Respective to CEDC cases, out of the 71 cases 42 are already terminated while the remaining number are still on-going case management and most likely for carry-over until the following year. For WEDC, out of the 46 cases, there are only 8 terminated cases for this year while the rest is still considered for carry over for next year. There is a low report of terminated cases because; the helping process of WEDC and CEDC cases takes several months.

For cases of children in conflict with the law (CICL), there are 11 children whose cases reached the prosecutors' and courts' level. Respective to WEDC cases we are pleased to inform that there are two sensitive cases that are now at the courts level.

Mrs. Imelda Ruiz and Elizabeth Radoc both registered social workers are accredited in handling court-related cases.

2. **Persons with Disability Affairs Office (PDAO)**. This center was established to cater to the affairs of the marginalized persons with disability (PWD) through a City Ordinance No. 2005-04. The primary function of this office is to ensure and promote the implementation of the Magna Carta for Disabled persons. However, the services is not limited to issuance of PWD Discount Card but it also provides



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services such as medical, dental services, provision of assistive and prosthetic devices to deserving clients, referrals to technical/vocational training and other support services.

Last October 27, 2010 there is a general orientation at the Don Leopoldo Sison Auditorium regarding the provisions stipulated in the Magna Carta for Disabled Persons focussing on the grants and benefits. It was attended by at least 135 adult and children with disabilities with their parents or guardians. Among the discussants were personnel from DSWD Region I, representative from the BIR, and manager of grocery and drug stores.

Immediately after the forum is the issuance of PWD discount Identification cards with purchase booklets. There is a total of 87 Ids released that day.

3. **Stimulation Therapeutic Activity Center (STAC).** This center provides free rehabilitative services to children with disabilities aged 0-14 years old. The services includes but not limited to the provision of physical therapy sessions, occupational therapy sessions, special education sessions, social skills enhancement activities and physiatrist check-up. The center also facilitates referrals of clients for minor and major surgery, clients needing attention of a medical specialist, provision of assistive devices, educational assistance and financial augmentation to families.

There are two stac centers operating. One is the main center at the 2nd floor of City Health Office and the other one is the satellite center located at barangay Alos.

For the year 2010, there are 195 CWDs undergoing treatment at the center and 13 new intakes that automatically undergone physiatrist check-up by Dr. Pollyana and further received medical attention by an EENT specialist and pediatric neurologist. Out of this number, there are 76 active clients who have sustained regular sessions.

There are 11 CWDs who received educational assistance of php 1,000 each under the Tuloy Aral Walang saGabal (TAWAG) program of the DSWD.

Hydrotherapy session is one of the strategies of rehabilitation as well as socialization activity. Last April 22, 2010 there are 80 CWDs with their parents and guardians who attended the activity.

Last July 15, 2010, the STAC joins the nation in the celebration of the annual National Disability Prevention and Rehabilitation Week. The highlight of this celebration is the holding of the Paralympic Competition that was joined by 15 kids. The winners represented the city to the Provincial level paralympic in Lingayen in June 22, 2010. The STAC Alaminos won 2nd place in the overall competition.

4. **Micro-finance Program funded by the LGU.** This project is initiated by the city government to provide no interest, non collateral loans to organized groups with entrepreneurial activities. This project has funded eight groups of 53 members with a total funding of Php362, 500.00. Out of this amount a very low return of Php 176,474.00 thus, a total of Php 186,026.00 remains unpaid.
5. **Self Employment Assistance Kaunlaran (SEA-K) Program.** This is a capability building project funded by the DSWD. This program seeks to enhance the social and economic skills of the economically active poor towards the establishment of sustainable self-managed community-based organizations for self-employment. There are 18 SEA-K Associations organized since 1994 with a total funding of Php 1,345,000.00. Out of the total amount released, the amount of Php 988,089.00 are paid hence, there is still a balance of Php 356,911.00.




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6. **Information Communication Technology Center (ICTC).** This caters to out-of-school youth aged 16 to 21 and who are poor but with willingness to finish education. This provides computer literacy programs with inculcation of life skills and eventual employment possible. This year we only have 8 graduates whose training started last year. New classes were suspended due to the broken electric transformers regulating flow of electricity to the office.
7. **Health Insurance Program in coordination with the PhilHealth.** To date we have 2,518 beneficiaries sponsored by the City Government. Out of this number there are 128 beneficiaries who are for replacement because of disqualification.
8. **Provision of Assistance to the Office of Senior Citizens Affairs (OSCA).** The highlight of this activity is the awarding of Accreditation of the Senior Citizens Center. This means that the center met the standards of a model center.
